The jewels must be listed, regardless of its apparent value. In addition, "missing" obvious jewels should be noted, such as only
a pierced earring or no wedding ring on a married individual. Currency and credit cards must be managed as precious items. The currency must be counted in the presence of another and the details of the noted credit card. Any medication, notes or any unusual object that may have been used by the subject should be confiscated (Dix et al., 1999). Interviews should include basic information such
as the identification of the subject, clothing, time, date, state of health, data and now the body has been discovered and medical, occupational and social history. Any recent events that may have an impact on death are also important. A death investigator should always ask if a deceased had recently been involved in potential malicious situations. This
information can be extremely useful if subsequent attempts are made to make an accident before a factor that contributes to death.
